On June 22, 1944, the Servicemen's Readjustment Act of 1944, commonly known as the G.I. Bill of Rights, was signed into law. During the war, politicians wanted to avoid the postwar confusion about veterans' benefits that became a political football in the 1920s and 1930s.

History of the Women's Army Corps . The Beginning The Honorable Edith Nourse Rogers, Congresswoman from Massachusetts, introduced the first bill to establish a women's auxiliary in May 1941. On 14 May 1942, Congress approved the creation of a Women's Army Auxiliary Corps (WAAC).

(1944) The "GI Bill of Rights" provided money for education and other benefits to military personnel returning from World War II. Veterans Administration A new government agency that was part the Servicemen's Readjustment Act of 1944, popularly known as the GI Bill of Rights.
