There has been increase in awareness of end-of-life and palliative care issues in recent years for the general public, as well as for people with intellectual and developmental disabilities (IDD). Despite these changes, clinical experience, public attitudes, medical practice, and legal opinion concerning caring at the end of life vary significantly across the United States.

Preventive care checklist for adults with developmental disabilities: The level of evidence is indicated for each recommendation and is based on the cited reference or references.

Life expectancy. Physicians were more likely to take a 'wait and see' approach. In a quarter of those who went to the doctor or to hospital, the concerns of the person with intellectual disabilities, their family or paid care staff said they were not taken seriously enough by medical professionals.
