Orlando Cepeda's number 30 was retired by the San Francisco Giants in 1999. By the early 1990s, when his time of eligibility for the Baseball Hall of Fame was beginning to run out, many Puerto Ricans, celebrities and ordinary citizens alike, began to campaign for his induction.
